

DOXOLOGY AS A DAILY PRACTICE

A few years ago, I attended a continuing education class where Fred Craddock of Emory's Candler School of Theology was the keynote speaker. Craddock made the point that praise and gratitude are the very bedrock of the Christian life. He prodded us to think how we incorporate doxology, a Greek word that literally means "to glorify," into our daily living. There are times when our doxology seems to rise out of the heart and overflow in words or acts of praise.

After a few days of overcast weather, the first hint of sunshine does that for me. "When morning guilds the sky," I want to sing. There are other times when I leave doxology behind and end up the lesser for it. Where can the praise be when I visit someone who is seriously ill? I better leave doxology back in the office or wait for Sunday worship. But then, not always but sometimes, even there in the sick room, there can be such family love present and such quiet acceptance of a difficult situation, that praise and thanksgiving do not seem out of place. God seems very much there, and doxology is not only an appropriate response, it enriches the experience.

At Christmas, Claire was skilled at getting me involved in a hundred small tasks. She claimed this was to make me feel a part of our festivities. I was entrusted with mailing packages, returning library books, buying some essential but forgotten ingredient for a pie or cake. Almost all these activities involved searching for scarce parking places and standing in long lines! Add in all the necessary details of ministry like planning worship services and writing sermons. When I was about to be overwhelmed by the activities, suddenly doxology would sneak around the corner and meet me where I least expected. Yes, I am a child of God. Yes, this world is the realm of God's rule. Yes, even now God is active and present.

Doxology is the way we relate to God. Recall how the Shorter Catechism declares that our chief end is to glorify and enjoy God for ever. We can study the Bible, worship every Sunday, attend all manner of church committee meetings, but if we don't have doxology on our lips, then our Christianity is flat and without sparkle. The Apostle Paul had every reason to be serious and stern, but if you read his letter to the Romans, he often interrupts the theological argument with bursts of doxology to God. "For from him and through him and to him are all things. To him be the glory forever. Amen." (Romans 11:36) --SCW

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE STATED SESSION MEETING

When the Session met Monday, January 23 at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary, Eric McManus opened the meeting with prayer and led a study using "The Ethos of the Reformed Tradition" by John Leith. The topic was, "The Majesty and Praise of God." This will begin a year-long study by the Session of hallmarks of the Reformed faith. Later, after moving to the John Knox Room, brief committee updates were made. The Finance Committee reported that overall income in 2022 was \$894,927 against expenses of \$796,878. Many thanks to the congregation whose generosity made a surplus possible. An operating budget for 2023 was adopted that will use \$43,593 of this surplus as carryover to fund have a balanced budget. The annual statistical report for 2022 was received indicating 31 new members were received and 4 members were dismissed by transfer or died. At the end of 2022, membership stood at 431. Committee chairs and members were approved, Presbytery commissioners and alternates for the year elected, the calendar for Holy Communion, stated Session meetings and the annual congregational meeting was scheduled. Zelda McRae was invited to preach at the annual women's service on Sunday, March 12. The various steps in organizing an ambitious Facilities Task Force along with its duties were discussed and an overall plan approved. This very exciting undertaking will seek to evaluate the many systems and meeting spaces of the church and develop a plan for maintaining, up-dating and improving them. Pick up a copy of the plan in the receptionist's office. The meeting closed with prayer at 8:50 p.m.

(Fundraising, scholarships and mission budget will cover the other 2/3 of trip cost.)




